

Relations at local level between universities and the intelligence services in the UK are strong. The focus of those relations has largely been on violent extremism/terrorism, whether related to animal rights or religion or other causes, with attention primarily being on the role of universities in preventing or minimising the development of violent extremism or terrorism on campus and in the local communities.

What has perhaps received less attention is:

- (i) any national overview of the relation between universities and violent extremism/terrorism; and how acting at national level universities can provide more effective support to the security services whilst at the same time preserving their autonomy and protecting fundamental freedoms and rights of staff and students;
- (ii) industrial espionage, which is increasingly being targeted at universities, particularly those carrying out world-leading technological and scientific research. This is an area that has received relatively little attention within the higher education community, despite the reality of foreign countries increasingly using increasingly sophisticated means to acquire information and technology in order to gain political and economic advantage;
- (iii) relating to both the above, the role of cyber terrorism and cyber espionage.

The Centre for the Protection of National Infrastructure (CPNI) is the inter-departmental government unit that leads on the provision of security advice to businesses and other national organisations including universities. Apart from dealing with issues of terrorism and national security, they are increasingly involved in reducing the threat from industrial espionage. According to their website (www.cpni.gov.uk) the UK is a high priority espionage target, and a number of countries are actively seeking UK information and material to advance their own military, technological, political and economic interests. CPNI assess the threat as 'severe'. They are concerned at the relative lack of awareness of these risks in the UK higher education sector, particularly in relation to the potential for electronic attack against computer networks.

These same issues have been addressed in the US by the establishment of a strategic partnership at national federal level between the US security services and US universities. Chaired by the President of Pennsylvania State University, Dr Graham Spanier, the National Security Higher Education Advisory Board (NSHEAB) was established in 2005 to bridge the historical gap between the US intelligence community and academia with respect to national security issues. Meetings are held at least three times a year and its terms of reference focus on serving as a conduit for discussion between universities and the relevant federal agencies, and supporting the development of coordinated activities and research.

(U) More than 48,000 total students attend Texas A&M University (TAMU) in College Station, Texas, 8,500 of which are graduate level, making it the seventh-largest university in the United States. TAMU's international student population is ranked 17th in the U.S., with over 4,000 currently enrolled. TAMU is also one of the nation's leading public research universities - it has invested nearly \$582 million in research, ranking it among the top 20 research universities nationwide.
